The project provides Bellefonte Borough and its police department a vision for a new facility, utilizing and adapting an existing building, the historic 1922 Armory. The current police facility is small and poorly organized, creating safety and accessibility concerns for its occupants. Student work is based on research relevant to modern amenities for police departments, security and public safety guidelines, and special needs identified by police department staff.

SCC coordinated a site visit to familiarize students not only with the existing building conditions but also neighborhood and local traffic and access concerns and considerations. Students also had the opportunity to visit a new police facility nearby, guided by police officers with training in building safety and critical real-world experience.

Student design and documentation will help the borough with future decision making by being better informed about potential design elements, visualizing, building traffic flow, and other considerations pertinent to the site and use.
